Scout day at Lexington UMC



Absorb is an on-demand learning platform that offers online courses on your timeline, at a pace that works for you. The goal of this learning platform is to support educational opportunities for those seeking lay certification as well as to equip local church leaders on a variety of topics to support their work.

Absorb, in the context of the UMC refers to an online learning platform, specifically a Learning Management System, used by the Missouri Annual Conference of the UMC to provide ondemand courses for lay certification and equipping local church leaders with various topics, allowing individuals to learn at their own pace on their timeline; essentially, it's a digital platform for continuing education within the church structure.

- Chairman Sarah Black called the meeting to order.
- Pastor Andrew opened with prayer.
- Pastor Andrew spoke about spiritual development.
- Sarah asked where will we be this time next year. We have to follow Jesus' teaching.
- Pastor Andrew said there was nothing new in leadership development. He stated that he will have a nomination's meeting soon to address leadership development.
- Pastor Andrew said to make sure each department/team is thinking "outside the box" as we go through the year – to be creative as we move forward.
- Pastor Andrew announced several families have expressed a desire to become members of LUMC.
- Pastor Andrew also said that Andrew Dye, a student from LHS is interested in joining Whispering Winds. He plays the tuba and has been attending with his parents and participating in Whispering Winds.

- Sharol motioned, seconded by Cheryl to accept the December 2024 minutes - so passed.
- Finance: Teri pointed out that the church was down by \$15K as she ◆ completed the 2024 financial report. Cheryl motioned, seconded by Teri to accept the 2024 final and December 2024 financial reports – so passed.
- Pastor Andrew said he is planning a Youth Night with laser tag and pizza for Sunday night, February 2nd. We now have nine youth attending our Youth ◆ Group.
- Cheryl announced that the February 9th rededication and renaming of the FLC to the Buddy Black Family Life Center meal will have the meat provided as well as ◆ bread. We will be in need of side dishes and desserts for the meal. Sarah said more people from outside the church are planning to attend.
- Sarah said the UMC churchwomen are looking for a project to do this year.
- Sharol said the Finance team will meet February 3rd to come up with some fundraising ideas for 2025.
- Liz reminded folks that the Charge Conference is January 21 at 6 p.m. in ◆ Marshall.
- Liz reported that the \$6,350 Buddy Black memorial funds were deposited into the church savings account with \$900 of it to go toward the remaining needed parking • lot repaving funds and \$4300 of it to replace the amount of funds borrowed \bullet in November.
- Sarah said she would like to have a

- church clean up day in the Spring possibly March or April - inside and out. She emphasized this to be an "all church clean up day."
- Liz presented a letter from Fire Chief Jim Martin, also our PPR chair requesting funds to go toward safety materials to hand out to youth in the community. After several questions, this was tabled until the February meeting and have Jim provide more information regarding the materials.
- Buddy Black rededication of the FLC will be a ribbon-cutting. Liz showed the new outdoor sign to the council and showed a photo of the prospective wooden plaque that has been ordered.
- Sarah reported that she would like to see the church having day trips this year to assorted areas in the metro. Patty Skelton will think of places to go and they will set up a once a month place to go ... for church members to travel, have lunch and socialize together - to promote community within our own church.
- A once a month carry-in potluck was suggested for a church activity, too.
- We will have the leadership covenant for 2025 at the February meeting for members to sign. The covenant will included expectations of leadership for the year.
- The next meeting will be February 17 at 6 p.m.
- After prayer, Sarah called the meeting closed.

Scripture Reading: Luke 5:1-11

A work of art was once a work in progress. -Adele Leon



The Galleria dell'Accademia di Firenze is the famous museum in Florence, Italy, where one can see Michelangelo's magnificent *David*. But the gallery is also home to four statues almost equal in fame — the Four Prisoners, also known as the Four Slaves. They were to be a part of the tomb of Pope Julius II, but they were unfinished. They seem to be half-born from the marble with which the sculptor was working. Scholars have given names: "The Awakening Slave," "The Young Slave," "The Bearded Slave," and "The Atlas (or Bound Slave)." According to the gallery website, "they are some of the finest examples of Michelangelo's habitual working practice, referred to as *non-finito* (or incomplete), magnificent illustrations of the difficulty of the artist in carving out the figure from the block of marble and emblematic of the struggle of man to free the spirit from matter."

It wasn't Michelangelo, but a renowned sculptor was once asked about his method for creating beautiful and lifelike statues. He replied, "When I look at a block of marble, I see the finished piece of art within it. All I have to do is chip away the excess stone to reveal the masterpiece inside."

The sculptor was then asked how he could envision such beauty in a rough block of marble. He answered, "I see the potential within the stone, not its current state. I know that with time, effort and patience, I can bring that potential to life."

In a way, we, too, are *non-finito* works of art in the hands of the Artist. In the hands of God, we are unfinished and incomplete, but growing toward splendor. God sees the potential within each of us. Jeremiah 18:1-6 tells the story of the potter and the clay, reminding us of God's sovereign ability to shape and transform us.


Though we may feel like unformed blocks of marble, God is at work, chipping away our rough edges, molding us, and shaping us into divine masterpieces. Our role is to remain pliable and open to God's transformative work, trusting that God knows what is best for us.
