Faith doesn't just happen on Sundays ... it's a lifestyle

e strive our entire lives to be remembered after we're gone. There's nothing better than to be remembered for your service to the kingdom of God.

Buddy Ray Black achieved that goal.

Buddy, who passed away December 5, 2024 at the age of 79 would have celebrated his 80th birthday on February 9, 2025. Instead, Lexington United Methodist Church members chose to honor his faith, servant's heart, dedication to the church and legacy by renaming and re-dedicating the Family Life Center to the Buddy Black Family Life Center.

The celebration included a ribboncutting, lunch and a time for family and friends to remember and honor Buddy.

He had a 45-year career working for the

electric company, for which he started as a tree trimmer and worked his way up to Director of Operations for the Northern Region of Missouri. He was certainly qualified for the service he gave to Lexington UMC.

He and his family moved to Lexington and joined LUMC in 1988. Buddy dove right into church activities and thrived at LUMC.

"As he became familiar with the pastors and fellow congregants, he realized the importance of God in our lives," said his wife, Sarah. "He realized the importance of faith in our life and devotion to do what you can to make it [the church] grow."

Buddy was involved in the church mens club, and adult Sunday School where he assisted Sarah. He taught the youth high school class, too. "The camaraderie he built with the kids was remarkable," Sarah said. "He took the kids for breakfast every Sunday. He taught them to drive in the church parking lot. He build a relationship of trust and faith with them"

Sarah added that those kids have told her the important part Buddy played in their lives.

"Faith didn't just happen on Sundays," she said. "It was a lifestyle."

Sarah stated that the current, newer United Methodist building exists because of Buddy.

He managed to get the congregation to approve building a new church, which she said was not an easy feat. After approval, he went to the bank and got the loan to start building. Then, a member's brother left a memorial of \$250K and

another left \$50K, which enabled the church to pay off the building loan, "in rapid time."

"Buddy planned and oversaw – diligently – the building of the church," Sarah said. He worked with the architect and, in the end, we had our current building.

Once it was built, the congregation, led by Buddy, painted and put the finishing touches on the interior and exterior of the building. Buddy, himself, worked on the electric, wiring, furnaces, plumbing and installing lights to get the facility up and running.

"He even refinished and put up the stained glass windows with [the late] Jim Cado," Sarah added.

The windows in the hallway and the Christ window behind the altar all came from the old Methodist church building at South and 13th streets. The north and south windows were donated by the McFadden and Worthington families.

Buddy was chairman of the building committee as well as trustee chair. Once the church was built, he kept up the maintenance here, even to the point where he reached out last fall to be sure the architectural renderings were kept somewhere accessible as the church office was being reorganized, just in case they were ever needed.

"He was here all the time," Sarah said. "Maintaining, repairing, doing touch up paint, whatever was needed to be





done."

Buddy and Sarah grew up together in Orrick. He was captain of the football team and she was the head cheerleader. Married in 1965, they would have celebrated 60 years of wedded bliss this year.

The couple has two daughters, Christy Dabalos and Rachael Marchetti, their husbands, and three beloved grandchildren, Mattie and Mia Marchetti and Aaron Dabalos.
